# What Does the World Think of You?

Most Christians have had the experience of having people look at them askance or thinking them a bit eccentric because of Christian faith. Their reactions may not overtly mock us and they may not question our intelligence or sanity openly, but we should not experience surprise. Jesus warned His disciples in the upper room, "If the world hate you, ye know that it hated me before it hated you" (John 15:18). The Apostle John, who sat in that upper room when Jesus issued that statement, reiterated it: "Marvel not, my brethren, if the world hate you." "Marvel not" translates a present imperative and means "cease wondering" (Robertson, Word Pictures in the New Testament, Vol. VI, p. 224). It indicates John's readers were surprised at the world's reactions to them. Stop wondering, he said. People may conceal their hatred with awkward smiles, eye-rolling, or by simply ignoring you. "Hatred" is a strong word, but the Bible indicates that is the reality.

**F. F. Bruce noted,** "The 'world' is the godless world, the world organized in opposition to God, and therefore opposed to his people" (*The Gospel of John*, p. 313). He went on to point out, "It is an odd fact that the world soon justified its hostility to them by imputing to them the initiative in hatred. The earliest extant reference to Christians in pagan literature [Tacitus, *Annals*, 15.44.5] charges them with 'hatred of the human race." It is nothing new in the world for unbelievers to call Christians "haters" as so many in our culture do today.

G. Campbell Morgan observed, "So long as the world is of the world, conditioning life wholly within the earthly, the materialistic order, it loves its own, its own people, its own ways, its own self-satisfaction. The world, so mastered, is bound to hate Jesus Christ Who comes crashing across everything in His first requirement, 'If any man would come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow Me.' Therefore the world hates Christ's people, that is, if they can see Christ in them. The measure in which the world agrees with us and says we are really a fine type of Christian, we are so entirely broad, is the measure in which we are unlike Jesus Christ." Jesus had a specific blessing for believers who reflect Him: "Blessed are ye, when men shall hate you, and when they shall separate you from their company, and shall reproach you, and cast out your name as evil, for the Son of man's sake" (Luke 6:22).

The world's attitude toward Christians says as much about the world as it does Christians. Paul explained, "The preaching of the cross is to them that perish foolishness; but unto us which are saved it is the power of God" (1 Cor. 1:18). "Foolishness" translates the Greek word μωρια, from which we get "moronic." Mare noted that "by  $\mu\omega\rho\iota\alpha$  ... Paul means that the message does not make any sense to those who are perishing" (The Expositor's Bible Commentary, Vol. 10, edit., Gaebelein, p. 195). "The present tense ... emphasizes the progressive state of those concerned: those who think the message foolish are now on the way to a final lostness in hell; those who respond are in the process of being saved by God's power." A. T. Robertson pointed out, "Salvation is described by Paul as a thing done in the past, 'we were saved' (Ro 8:24), as a present state, 'ye have been saved' (Ep 2:5), as a process, 'ye are being saved' (1Co 15:2), as a future result, 'thou shalt be saved' (Ro 10:9)" (Word Pictures in the New Testament, Vol. IV, p. 77).

In 1 Corinthians 4, Paul said he himself was regarded as "the filth of the world, ...the offscouring of all things" (vs. 13). "Scum of the earth" would be a good translation. That's a pretty low position. Earlier in the chapter, Paul gave the proper perspective on public opinion: "It is a very small thing that I should be judged of you, or of man's judgment" (vs. 3). "Man's judgment" literally is "by human day." Man's judgment, public opinion, is not what matters. Man's judgment does not endure. What matters is God's judgment, which is eternal. Gordon Fee observed, "His personal evaluations of his own performance are irrelevant; what his master thinks is what counts" (*The First Epistle to the Corinthians*, p. 161).

What the world thinks of us does not matter, except in the sense Morgan observed, which bears repeating, "The measure in which the world agrees with us and says we are really a fine type of Christian, we are so entirely broad, is the measure in which we are unlike Jesus Christ." G. K. Chesterton wrote, "A dead thing can go with the stream, but only a living thing can go against it" (*The Everlasting Man*). As Christians we are going against the stream of the world.

Jesus said, "These things I have spoken unto you, that in me ye might have peace. In the world ye shall have tribulation: but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world" (John 16:33).
